Dr. Berenecea Johnson Eanes President of California State University, Los Angeles Thursday, October 17, 2024 at 5PM

Dr. Berenecea Johnson Eanes is Cal State LA's ninth president and the first woman to serve in the position. Dr. Eanes earned a bachelor's degree in public health from Dillard University; a master's degree in social work from Boston University; and her doctorate in social work from Clark Atlanta University.



Dr. Eanes previously served as president of York College, City University of New York, as well as a professor in the Department of Social Work since 2019. Her appointment as president of Cal State LA marked a return to the CSU for Eanes, who previously served as vice president for Student Affairs at California State University, Fullerton (2012 to 2019), where she delivered leadership and oversight for myriad student success programs, as well as new campus infrastructure and the university's strategic plan.

Dr. Hakeem Oluseyi Astrophysicist & Professor Friday, October 18, 2024 at 9:15AM

Dr. Hakeem Oluseyi graduated with a B.S. in Physics and Mathematics from Tougaloo College, and M.S. and Ph.D. degrees in Physics from Stanford University. He is an astrophysicist, inventor, renowned science communicator, global STEM education advocate, and US military veteran.




Dr. Oluseyi has held professorships at the Florida Institute of Technology, MIT, University of California at Berkeley, University of Washington, and the University of Cape Town. He has also served as the Space Science Education Manager for the Science Mission Directorate at NASA Headquarters, and Chief Science Officer for Discovery Science. He is currently an Affiliated Professor of Physics and Astronomy at George Mason University and President of QuarkStarr, Inc.






